Planting seeds of friendship

Dedi is a lecturer at The Salvation Army Theological College in Palu, a busy city in Sulawesi, Indonesia. He is also a youth leader at the Towua corps on the same site, where he runs a youth group on Sundays.

The group is popular and is growing fast. It is down to Dedi's inspirational approach. He reaches out to young people in all corners of his community who are struggling. Where some may see 'drug addicts' or 'sex workers', Dedi sees 'young people' and offers them a hand of friendship.

"Our principle is that we are never better than the people we serve," he said. It is friendship, not judgement, that is bringing over 800 young people to worship together at his Sunday youth group.

Growing skills to serve

Dita came from her small town of Palolo to Palu to train at The Salvation Army nursing school. Today she is a nurse at The Salvation Army hospital which she proudly calls, 'the best hospital'.

Her journey, from a small town to adapting to life in a big city, reflects how she has grown in her faith and her service.

The thread of The Salvation Army is woven into her life, as a soldier and as a nurse, enabling her to serve her community.

Nurturing the next generation

Every year, around 50 cadets enrol at The Salvation Army Officer Training Centre in Jakarta, the capital of Indonesia. Flora is one the latest recruits, just months into her training.

Before becoming a cadet, Flora used to make handicraft products. She was called to officership by God. "My hope in becoming an officer is that I can dedicate myself, dedicate my life to serve God, to serve others," she said.

Flora represents the future generation of The Salvation Army, who are ambitious and eager to go out and serve. With over 10 million people living in Jakarta, the challenge is great and her determination is strong.
